At the August vestry meeting, we received the good news that our budget and expenses are right on track. Unfortunately, that means the predicted \$24,000 deficit is right on track as well. The vestry constantly struggles with how to remedy this situation. At the meeting, we were "forced" to vote a bequest to be used in the general fund instead of being used for the new kitchen. On a positive note, we had our first rental of the new parish hall and things went very well. Future rentals are expected.

We have lots of exciting events coming up: Rummage Sale, Golf Outing, Tricky Tray, Parish Development Dinner and the Celebration of St. James' which includes a Murder Mystery Dinner. Please take advantage of all the opportunities to participate and give. We look forward to a busy and productive fall season.

I thought I would use this space to provide a brief mid-year report on the finances of St. James'. Everyone is accustomed to hearing all about finances at the annual meeting in January, when the budget for the New Year is proposed. For most church members, they don't hear much more about the budget again until the next Annual Meeting (of course the Vestry and Finance Committee members deal with finances throughout the year).

There is certainly good news, The offerings so far this year have exceeded the budget by about 10% and the year-to-date expenses are a few percent lower than the budgeted amount. So, the church's finances are tracking the budget very closely. However, our financial advisors made some changes to the Snyder Memorial Fund portfolio late last year and earlier this year when financial markets were in turmoil. This was necessary to lower the overall risk of the portfolio and it resulted in reduced income generation, as higher yielding investments were replaced with more stable (but lower yielding) investments. The net result is the Foundation Fund Income will be reduced by about \$15,000 this year, which will leave an overall budget shortfall of nearly

Clearly, having a shortfall of this magnitude is unsustainable as we go forward.

As the 2010 budget is being developed over the next several months, the St. James' leadership would welcome any suggestions or recommendations. The dates and times of the Finance Committee meetings will be announced and all are welcome to attend and share their ideas and concerns.

As the van was being packed, the workers headed for Appalachia kissed families goodbye and prayed for safe travel as the Rector sprinkled their trusty transport with holy water. Barbara White, Sylvia Okoye, Matthew Malejko, Katie Lacouture and Cathy Deats worked on a variety of projects in southwest Virginia for Episcopal Appalachian Ministries. Katie's team put a new tin roof on a house and Cathy and Sylvia built a 24-foot ramp to provide more freedom for a young teenager. Matt worked with the oldest of the workers (two men, each 80+) and a homeowner who was a retired (disabled) carpenter "who had every tool ever made!" EAM provides services for Appalachian families throughout the year, and for three weeks each summer, gathers people from around the northeast and mid-west to join in service to make the homes of local residents warm, safe and dry.

After each days' work, the teams gathered to reflect on their experiences. The community life in the mountains and "hollers" of Appalachia is very different from our lives in northwestern New Jersey. All the workers agreed that they really bonded with the families they worked with and learned new things about generosity and dedication to family.

The thirty workers ranged in age from fifteen to eighty-plus. St. James' has sponsored groups to EAM for the past eight years. Matthew, Barbara, Katie and Sylvia are all workers with two or more trips under their tool belts. Barbara is a member of the Vestry, Matthew and Katie are students at Hackettstown High School, and Sylvia is a freshman at Wheaton College in Massachusetts. All three teens are active members of the St. James' Youth Group.

All are hoping to return to workcamp next year! *Cathy*

We have *not* been working feverishly over the summer! That is the way of Sabbath rest. Our committees are four in number, and the descriptions follow here. Choose one to be involved with, at the level you can manage. Special Events Committee assists in the work of the Special Event (the big dinner). They also will plan and implement a series of events throughout the anniversary. They pick the location, negotiate the deal and work out the details. Coordinator: Barbara White

Host / Hostess Committee sends out the invitation to the Special Event and other events. Then, they call all the members of the congregation to see who is coming. In their calls, they try to assist those who need assistance in attending the event. Any pastoral issues that are discovered are forwarded to the appropriate persons. On

the night of the event they are the greeters and make nametags. Coordinator: Eileen Malejko

Ministry Committee is the soul of the campaign. They write a collect for the campaign that is read during the Sunday services. They may plan a Bible study, a vigil, a special service.

In some churches they have members write about what the church means to them, or how the church helps them in their daily life, and how it helps them in their spiritual development. Coordinator: Phyllis Heistand

A Kitchen Update

The kitchen committee has been working very hard these last couple of months designing our new kitchen. In addition to obtaining quotes for appliances, we have also been choosing flooring and picking out cabinets and countertops. The flooring and cabinets should be installed in the next few weeks. As far as appliances go, we have received 3 quotes: refrigerators (double door reach in type) averaging \$2500, gas stoves/ranges (6burner) averaging \$2500, sinks at \$780, dishwashers at \$3300. These quotes are for new and used equipment. In addition, the required hood for our kitchen is currently running about \$1400 a foot and we will need approximately 4-6 feet. We continue to search for appliances that will keep our cost down, so if you know of a restaurant that is closing or auctions for restaurant equipment, please let us know.

We still have long way to go but the kitchen is taking shape and I know in God's good time, and with your help, we will soon be smelling the pancakes and sausage drifting through the parish hall.




