SABBATICAL TIME IS FINISHED. It is time to get back to work. And if sabbatical time was truly "a day of peace," and "a time of becoming whole," then things should never be the same. We should have some sparkling memories of connection with the divine in unexpected places, not too much frustration about the difference between what is and what could be, and gentle callings to the work that God has equipped us to do. My own time away had all these qualities, and from the looks of things around St. James', your time did too.

This is a natural time of re-evaluation. Summer is winding down, indeed, abruptly ending for those who return to school. While it is too hot to think of putting away our summer clothing, we are switching gears and revising calendars. Sometimes we just allow activities to fill the days and weeks, rather than pause and ask, what is the best way to use the time I have? The church has a name for this process: discernment. More than just to consider or decide, discernment has within its meaning a meditative sense as well as a sense of the holy. In the Christian tradition, discernment is most often used to describe the process of determining what is my ministry, *here and now*, and how would God have me live out that ministry.

The Rev. Betsy Myers, our sabbatical priest, gently let us know that when a priest goes on sabbatical, it gives us all permission, perhaps invitation, to take a break and re-evaluate. Witness the shifts in our own community leadership for Youth Group and Sunday School. The leaders of these ministries are listening closely to the voice of God in their lives; they have discerned that God is calling them into new ministries. They have stepped aside in order that they might follow God's leading and make way for others to serve. This may seem strange at first; typical church tradition is to expect that the leader of a ministry will continue to lead as long as they are members of the community.

For me, it is like being caught in a time warp: I see the child I baptized (wasn't that just a couple of years ago?) surpass me in height; it is when the AARP generation says, "And the cop who pulled me over was about 12 years old!" Time marches on, people and their families grow and change, God calls us to new places on our journey. We can ignore these realities or we can bring our thoughts and feelings to God, to our community, and to our prayer life. Our lives are

constantly changing, sometimes quickly, as with illness or disability or death; sometimes more quietly, as with the usual shifts of marriage and relationship or children arriving and leaving. The process of listening to our lives, reflecting on the journey, and bringing it all before God is discernment. And discernment always brings us to a new place.

As we begin the new "program year," we too are in a new place. The year 2009 was spent celebrating our 150 years of building community. We celebrated so much that it spilled over into 2010! We talked a lot about what St. James' has meant to us in our lives, and what the community has given us. Now, we are ready to move into another part of the journey God has called us to.

In the process of our formal parish development process, new leaders have stepped forward into new ministries. We are more active in our local Hackettstown community; we are faithful people of prayer, both private and public. Your Vestry leaders also recognize that to grow in spirit and in number, more members of the community need to be present in our work, which is both worship and ministry.

This is the year where we all will be asked, "where can you contribute your skill and time to the St. James' community?" It is not just "doing church work." It is asking God where, in this community that feeds you, can you serve so others can be fed. Is there a mission or ministry that catches your heart or your eye, or simply fits your schedule? No skill or amount of time is too big or too small to be shared. And in case God is nudging you to be challenged beyond your usual comfort zone, your fellow disciples will be there to encourage and support you.

There are places of need for everyone to be part of the work of St. James'. Those in leadership now will be unafraid to ask you to help and unafraid to say, "We need your help." They will also welcome you coming to them, asking "How can I help?"

Please join me in this prayer:

Living God, fuel my heart with trust, my will with nerve, my mind with you.

And I am ready.

Warden's Letter

JUST LIKE LAST YEAR AT THIS TIME, I decided to use this space to provide a brief mid-year report on the finances of St. James'. This allows church members the opportunity to get a snapshot of the church's finances, without having to wait until the Annual Meeting next January.

As of the end July, the church's total income in 2010 was about \$1,400 above the budgeted amount. That number, however, is deceiving because \$10,000 of income was the result of a bequest. Without the bequest, total income is down \$8600, or 9.3%. The income stream typically slows during the summer and then picks up again in the fall. Hopefully, the income shortfall will be minimized (or eliminated) in the coming months.

Things are going according to plan on the expense side. As of the end of July total expenses are about \$2,300 below budget (a good thing!). However, the diocesan pledge is about \$4,000 behind (a bad thing!). Overall, the expenses are in close alignment with the budget.

The church's investments are doing fairly well, considering the turbulent economy. The value of the Snyder Memorial Fund is now \$16,900 higher than it was at the beginning of the year. In addition, \$12,000 of investment income has been used to help fund the operating account (so the fund has actually gone up almost \$31,000 this year). The total assets in the Building Fund stand at almost \$219,000, which is about \$19,000 less than the start of the year. Not bad, considering almost \$41,000 in mortgage payments were made this year. As the 2011 budget is being developed over the next several months, the St. James' leadership would welcome any suggestions or recommendations. The dates and times of the Finance Committee meetings will be announced and all are welcome to attend and share their ideas.....and the Finance Committee is always looking for additional members!

Thank you, Sam and Louise, and thank you all for your support

After our Sunday morning worship in the Parish Hall, one of our parishioners, noticing brown chairs, green chairs, yellow chairs, chairs with padding and chairs without padding, decided that we needed matching chairs in our hall and generously donated fifty new folding chairs with padded burgundy seats. The chairs arrived last week and were immediately unpacked and put to very good use during coffee hour last week. Thank you for that generous donation.

These are just a few examples of how not just your financial commitment to St. James' has impacted our community but your gifts of valuable time and extraordinary talent impact the mission of our church. This is an amazing community.

Thanks to Peg Faust and Chika Okoye for answering the call for coffee hour coordinators, one of our very important ministries, feeding us on Sunday morning. Please be sure and let them know which week you can host coffee hour.

As you know, we have a couple of positions that need to be filled: Sunday School coordinator and Youth Group coordinator. If you are being called to one of these ministries, please talk to Kathy Lacouture for Sunday School, Dawn Modugno for Youth Group or Cathy for either.

L'Arche in the city

The first L'Arche home opened in Liverpool in 1976. The core members came from long-term institutions to live in the house called Anchorage. Today, L'Arche has five homes, a group of flats and a workshop not only for its own members, but for others with learning disabilities who live in the larger Liverpool community. L'Arche has grown and changed here and throughout the United Kingdom; regulations governing the care of people with learning disabilities have likewise changed. And in the past few years, as we all know, the economy has changed, causing more adjustments by organizations and governments. So of course, what L'Arche Liverpool is facing now is how to deal with lots of change.

I spent time in the workshop, where jobs are done and crafts are made for sale. In the printing room, we worked to assemble greeting cards and stationery. Candles and weaving projects, like bags and scarves, were made in other parts of the workshop.

What EFM has meant in my life

Excerpts from a letter by Linda Ayres

Eleven years ago my husband Robert, died suddenly of a heart attack, leaving me to raise two children alone. I slipped into a deep dark depression for many years, withdrawing from everyone that I was close to and everyone who cared about me especially the members of St. James' Church. In 2007 I had started to come out of my depression and I attempted Year One of EFM (Education for Ministries) but I was in so much physical pain from my back that I had to withdraw.

I was feeling much better in 2009; I really felt like the time was right to try to take EFM again. So I reenrolled in Year One (The study of the Old Testament) and what a difference. Don't get me wrong; it was difficult because of medication issues but the feeling I got from studying the Old Testament and learning everything that I wanted to know about, and then talking about it at class the following week was amazing. And each week the spiritual feelings grew stronger and stronger and my ability to study became easier and easier.

By midyear in December I...had a sense of well being and peace, knowing that God was truly in my life; knowing that I could turn any and all of my problems to him; as well as attribute my blessings to him. I had come full circle, I had come out of my depressive shell, I was sharing with people outside my EFM group and attending Church more often as my back permitted, and I was venturing outside of that closed little circle that I had created for myself after my husband had died.

I am anxiously anticipating Year Two of EFM (The New Testament).

Music Director's Musings

I've been told by a reliable source that this year's Stewardship theme will be more about time and talent than usual. I hope I'm not stealing anyone's thunder but your Adult Choir could sure stand in the front of the line to receive your time and talent!

We're willing to meet you half-way, too! We are taking a new approach to the "anthem" part of our weekly musical offering by creating an "anthem choir". The anthem is usually sung while the offerings of the congregation are being collected but is occasionally sung in place of the Psalm. The Anthem Choir will augment the regular choir during the singing of the anthem. This means no robes, no processing around the church as the service starts or as it ends, and very little, if any, climbing up to the choir loft to sing. It also means you can remain with your family during the service, joining the regular choir only for the anthem and then returning to your pews. Even 'little ones' are welcome to come and stand quietly with Mom or Dad while singing. Maybe even Youth Group participants could come over for the anthem, then return to class because the Adult Choir is open to high school and college students, too!

So here's where the 'Time and Talent' part comes in:

Time: all you have to do is be willing to commit 90 minutes of time on Thursday evenings to attend rehearsals and about 35-40 more minutes on Sunday mornings before the 10am service to warm-up for and review the anthem. As an added bonus, you'll get to learn all the hymns we'll be singing in church that Sunday because we practice them during rehearsals, too! You don't need to commit to every rehearsal or every Sunday, either, if something comes up that you have to attend to. Just let me know in advance so I can plan the music accordingly!

Talent: you don't need a big, strong voice to sing in the choir (regular or anthem); you don't need to sing like an opera star or a rock star! Just be able to sing on pitch and carry a part once you learn it. You'll generally have about four rehearsals to learn each piece and people to sing your part with! If you aren't sure whether you can sing on pitch or learn to carry a tune, come and try! If it doesn't work out, that's ok!

If you have need of some babysitting during rehearsals, we might be able to arrange something, so don't let that stop you either!

By the time you are reading this, we will have had our first choir rehearsal and maybe some of you have already attended! If not, don't let that stop you! There's plenty of time to catch up as we aren't singing an anthem until September 12th!

I hope we'll see YOU on Thursday!

Organ Recitals by Jonathan Biggers, Jason Roberts – 2008 winner AGO National Competition in Organ Improvisation, Michael Unger – 2008 winner AGO National Young Artists Competition in Organ Performance, David Higgs, Isabelle Demers, Ulrike Theresia Wegele, Bruce Neswick.

Choral groups: Washington National Cathedral Choral Society, the Choir of the Basilica, Washington Chorus, Cantate Chamber Singers, The Woodley Ensemble.

Instrumental groups: Virginia Bronze Handbell Ensemble, National Brass Quintet, Fessenden Ensemble.

Workshops: New Songs of Celebration Render: Enlivened Hymn-Singing, Music for Handbells, I Really Thought I Would Have This Piece Ready, But..., The Music of Salamone Rossi.

Additional sessions: Jewish Worship Service featuring the music of Salamone Rossi, a Hymn Festival, Carillon Recital by Robert Grogan, carillonneur.

Closing Concert – Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception with the Choir of the

Basilica, The Washington Chorus and David Briggs and Reneé Anne Louprette, organists.

There was standing room only in this immense facility and the event was inspiring and spectacular.

The venues I went to included the National Presbyterian Church, Chevy Chase Presbyterian Church, National City Christian Church, United States Naval Academy Chapel, Old St. Patrick Roman Catholic Church, St. Paul's Episcopal Church - Rock Creek Parish, Crypt Church of the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception, Cathedral of Saint Matthew the Apostle (Roman Catholic), Sixth and I Historic Synagogue.

It was a great experience to hear world famous concert organists playing on fantastic organs in beautiful churches. Many of the pieces played throughout the convention were commissioned works with the composers present. Much of the remaining music was from the 20th century. Lest you think it was all very modern, it was all very accessible and easy on the ears.

Altar Guild

Greenway Florist has informed St James' that it is changing its billing practice for weekly Altar flowers as of September 1, 2010.

Previously members of the congregation would sign up as flower donors the last Sunday before New Year's or in response to a notice in the Sunday Bulletin. Our Parish Administrator would then send a list of donors with addresses to Greenway at the beginning of each month. Greenway would bill donors directly \$22 for the two floral arrangements.

A few years ago at the request of our Rector, I interviewed the five local florists to determine if we would change our floral supplier. No one could provide two arrangements for the \$22 currently charged; the new cost would have been \$40-50 for the weekly arrangements. And no florist would bill donors directly. Rather St James' would be billed monthly and then our Parish Administrator would have to collect from the donors. Or in one case, donors would have to supply the florist with their credit card numbers. At that time, the decision was made to continue with Greenway.

The Wardens and Altar Guild reviewed this new situation and determined that it would be pointless to reinterview local florists – their prices would probably not have come down, and the billing procedure would not have changed. Therefore, we will keep Greenway Florist as our weekly Altar flower supplier.

Procedure for flower donations will be as follows:

- 1. When congregants sign up as flower donors at the beginning of the year, please send a check made out to St James' Altar Guild for \$22 for each donation. This can be placed in the offering plate.
- 2. The counters will separate Altar Guild checks out for deposit in the Altar Guild account.
- 3. Altar Guild treasurer will pay Greenway monthly.
- 4. Checks can also be mailed to the Parish office.
- 5. Should Greenway increase its process for the arrangements, we will address this as needed.
- 6. Those congregants who would become delinquent regarding payments will be handled on an individual basis.
- 7. There is a list in the Narthex of Altar Flower donors for September 2010 through the end of the year. Members of St James' should review this list and send in checks accordingly.
- 8. Most important to remember...checks need to be paid to the order of the Altar Guild.

Many thanks as we work through this.

Backpack Program Extends Into the Summer

As the worship schedule returns to our customary two services, we can take a few moments to reflect on our summer as a one-service congregation. Although we usually attend one of two services, in the summer we meet as one congregation, share the same liturgy, sing, and this summer, joined together as members of the Mission Strategy Committee. We participated in a program coordinated by St. James that gave outreach to our community through our Mission Strategy volunteers by providing food for local children through the summer.

The school year Backpack Program, coordinated by Nicole Keane, organizes prepackaged weekend meals for approximately 50 children in the elementary schools in Hackettstown. The weekly participants are eligible because of food insecurity and receive either free or reduced priced lunches at school. Nicole and her volunteers deliver backpacks each Friday to the Hatchery Hill and Willow Grove Elementary Schools consisting of a breakfast, lunch, snack and drinks for the kids to take home for the two day weekend. Funding from the United Way of Warren County is used to purchase food packages supplied through NORWESCAP and given to St. James'.

Rev. Deats sought to extend this outreach effort through the summer months while school is in recess. Together with the United Way of Warren County, a plan was developed to provide supplemental nutrition for eleven weeks, from the end of June to the beginning of September. Participants were sought from the regular program with the cooperation of school personnel. The United Way of Warren County supplied the food stuffs

based on a combination of direct purchases and donations at drop-off boxes throughout the town at local merchants. These donations were stored and organized by the Skylands Bank and then delivered to St. James'. Each week, during the coffee hour, our congregation members were enlisted to pack bags with food. We used bags supplied by the United Way and filled them each with two days worth of breakfast cereal, a heatable lunch, fruit drink or Yoohoo, and various snacks such as pudding cups, fruit cups, apple sauce, gellcups with fruit and cookies or pretzels. Through the summer we assembled just over 700 bags. That translates to about 1400 meals.

Saturday was distribution day. Our parish volunteers, Nicole Keane, Courtney Keane, Rick Ames, Justin Simpson, Maryann Simpson, Phyllis Bartkus and community members: Mary Testerman, Christine Domanico and Anna Daniher alternated Saturdays to greet the participant children and their parents and distribute the packages, as well as information about community food pantries and services. Each child received three bags, or supplemental food for six days. These volunteers were able to see the happy children getting their food packs and to receive the thanks from the parents. They indicated that this extra help had made a difference for their children over the summer and extended their gratitude for our support. Our church's participation once again reflects that we are all members of the Mission Strategy Committee, providing outreach and support to our community.
