# Awe, Wonder and ... Fear?

A seminarian reflects on the power of the Eucharistic Prayer

It has been almost eight weeks since Michelle and I were welcomed with open arms to the community at St. James'. We are both grateful to all of you for the loving and warm reception, and for taking us in as part of this wonderful community.

During these past weeks at St. James', I have experienced some of the most formational, transformational and life changing experiences in my spiritual journey. Every Thursday afternoon, I'm blessed with the opportunity of sharing these experiences with Cathy Deats. I listen to her insights and wisdom as I wrestle with emotions, feelings and the meaning of these experiences and their impact in my life. A few Sundays ago, I had a very moving and paradigm-changing experience that I would like to share.

It was a hectic Sunday at the church, the family breakfast had gathered many families and many voices in the Great Hall. I had the opportunity to observe Cathy moving from one place to another, greeting people, solving various "little things" that arose, and even having a few moments to sit down and have breakfast. I remember thinking to myself "wow, that is a lot of stuff and it's only nine in the morning".

At the ten o'clock service, I was serving as a LEM and reader. After the Psalm, as I started to prepare for the second reading, I was thrown off "rhythm" when I looked at the book and noticed that it was open to the reading from the previous week. My mind started to race - my first thought was: "This is not what is in the bulletin." For one second, I fumbled with the options of looking for the reading in the book (which I like better because of the larger print and longer sentences) or to read from the bulletin. I settled for the latter. My heart was racing! Despite several attempts, I felt that I was not able to bring my rhythm down; I felt that I had done a poor job of "emptying" my mind and walking into the reading. I did not like the way I read. Afterwards, I wondered what would have happened had I taken another five or even ten seconds to find the correct page in the book.

Those thoughts were still racing through my mind as we came to the Eucharist. I have served at the Altar multiple times in the last six years. I have done almost everything, from setting the table, to passing the pages, to complete ablutions. What I had never done before, however, was to stand silently to the side of the celebrant with "nothing to do" but to follow along in the Eucharistic Prayer. This was a different and new perspective for me.

As Cathy started the Eucharistic Prayer B (my favorite by the way and I started to submerge myself in it, I felt a sense of awe and wonder that I have become familiar with every time I hear the Eucharist Prayer. But, at the same time I felt a sensation that I had never experienced before during the Eucharist. As I explored the feeling, I found myself saying: "I'm scared, this feeling is fear." The more I pondered on the feeling, I realized that from within the celebrant a breath of air is thrust forward becoming an instrument of the Holy Spirit. And along with the presence of the congregation,



the words of the prayer and the love and sacrifice of our Lord Jesus Christ come all together to mediate and create a window in which then and now become one in time and space.

At that moment, I could feel that through that threshold, we become one with Christ, with the Apostles, with each and every congregation of Christians who have celebrated the Eucharist throughout hundreds of centuries;

and also one with Christians and Episcopalians who may be celebrating the Eucharist at the same moment or on the same day. Cathy had preached about the "energy or power of faith" earlier and I thought that the amount of energy that was being generated at the moment had to be magnificent, that if it could be pictured or seen it would be an incredible scene in a science fiction movie like Start Trek or Star Wars, and that if it could be seen, a part of me might feel a little scared. It also scared me to think that the celebrant is asked by God to empty his or her mind and heart of the things of this world, of the many little things going on that morning and, of the various things that may require attention after the service. How am I going to do that?

Later, during the week as I continued to pray and wrestle with the feeling of fear, I started to compare it with the sensation of fear I feel every time I fly. No matter how many thousands of hours I have flown, every time I'm about to make the motions to lift up or to land (particularly if I'm mating a helicopter and a ship), even if every instrument is displaying the appropriate information, there is a sense of awe, wonder and fear at all that is involved in defying gravity in such a manner. I know that such a feeling has served me well throughout the years. So, perhaps this feeling is much like it, a sense of awe, wonder and fear in the presence of the incredible power of the Eucharistic Prayer, a feeling that is worth praying that I never lose.

# St. James' Episcopal Church Honors our Fallen

St. James' will hold its Veterans' Day service on Sunday, **November 7<sup>th</sup>**, 2010. The service will begin at 12:00 PM and includes the reading of the names of U. S. soldiers who have lost their lives during this war in both Afghanistan and Iraq.

Armistice Day became Veterans' Day by an act of Congress in 1954. President Eisenhower called on the nation to remember the sacrifices of those who fought in all our nation's wars, to celebrate the contributions of all veterans of military service, and to rededicate ourselves to the task of promoting an enduring peace. It is Eisenhower's call that remains the three-fold purpose of Veterans' Day: remembering those who fought and died, celebrating all veterans, and promoting an enduring peace.

And so on this day, we remember, we celebrate and we pray.

And we invite you to join us. Our service is continuous for as long as needed to read the more than 6,000 names. Everyone is welcome to join us for a few minutes, for a half hour or whatever you are comfortable with. Our service usually takes 5-6 hours; we read the names in 15-minute segments and separate each segment with a prayer.
