

"The Episcopal Church Welcomes You"



This invitation is seen on the familiar blue and white signs on city streets and country roads, directing people to an open and welcoming church. St. James' has these signs directing people to us on High Street and Route 46.

When it became time to order one for the House of the Good Shepherd's St. Margaret's Chapel, I went to the website where one orders such things only to find out that the business of printing the enameled metal signs had been transferred to another company. Their website declared that The Episcopal Church had redesigned the signs, previously available in two styles ("traditional" and "contemporary"), now declaring only one design the "official" design. I must admit that I don't care for the new design; it separates "The Episcopal Church" from "welcomes you," in a way I find unpleasing to the eye as well as the theology. But time marches on, many things change that we don't like or agree with, and as my grandmother used to say, "I'm not gonna die in that ditch!"

The sign may have changed, but the meaning is the same: The Episcopal Church Welcomes You.

It means that you are welcome to share in our worship, fellowship and community life. It means that you are welcome even if you do not believe the same things about God or the Republican Party that the person who sits beside you in church believes. It means you are welcome wherever you are on your spiritual journey: seeker, doubter, one with a deep spiritual life or one with a curiosity but not much head knowledge about things "religious."

But as we stop and look deeply into the meaning of welcome, as with many important things, there is much more beneath the surface. It is in this place beneath the glossy blue and white invitation that we often encounter the challenge of the gospel.

Last weekend your Vestry gathered at the Kirkridge retreat center just over the river in Pennsylvania. We go each year to this place apart to focus on the mission and ministry of St. James' and how best to lead this community to proclaim the gospel in our corporate life. In the "getting to know each other" phase, we learned that most of us arrived in Hackettstown and at St. James' as the result of a *relationship*. A spouse lived here and so we settled here, or a Roman Catholic married a Methodist so The Episcopal Church seemed like a good compromise. We talked about who would feel welcome among us Episcopalians (even though most of us were not born that way). The answer is: Anyone who is looking for a healthy community in which to serve God.

But the church is not just any community group. We are not the Rotary, AA or the Friends of the Library, as outstanding as those groups may be. We are bound together by our baptismal promises to love and serve our Lord Jesus Christ, each other, and the world in ways that are not always fun and comfortable. As Episcopalians, our welcome is to include all -- anyone who needs assistance to hear or see or move; anyone who needs us to speak their language or make our language understandable to them; anyone who disagrees with my political opinion; anyone. The call of the gospel is not a romantic notion; it is a hard road, a road full of sacrifice but also full of joy. We sacrifice so all can participate; we sacrifice so our children will learn welcome; we sacrifice so our community of the future can answer the call of God in their time and place.

The best image of the resurrection for us is not daffodils, chicks and bunnies. It is not eggs, although some great Sunday School lessons have come out of that. It may not even be the empty tomb for us living in 2012. For me, the resurrection is found in the glory of the footsteps of the women who approached Jesus' tomb. God knows they had walked that road many times; there was no expectation of anything being any different from the

other bodies they had anointed. But they went and saw, in the midst of their daily chores, the risen Lord. Such an awesome thing could not be kept to themselves – they had to go and tell.

And that is the key to our welcome – to not wait until someone finds us, but to go and tell what we have found.

Alleluia! Christ is risen!
The Lord is risen indeed! Alleluia!

From the Wardens

Each year at our Vestry retreat we take an intense look at St. James' and the mission and ministries of our community and this year was no different. During one of our first sessions we look at what we do in church and in the community. Our list grows with each passing year and it is quite impressive; we have a real presence in this community. St. James' is truly doing the work of God. Of course our goal is to do even more, and in order to do that we must understand that we need growth. Last year we returned from the retreat and roped off one side of the church in an effort to impress upon everyone that we have plenty of room for more of God's children. Since last year I see many new faces in our midst and am encouraged and excited by the limitless possibilities we have before us.

Over the last couple of months I have attended meetings in Newark involving a newly organized Mission Strategy committee. It is a committee appointed by the Bishop in an effort to reach out to all the churches in our Diocese and help them discern how God is calling them to do ministry in their communities. Growing congregations and growth in ministry are obviously directly linked. What I have heard several times is "we are not looking for Episcopalians, we are looking for people" and I believe that people are looking for us. People that are looking for a faith community for the first time, or experiencing a difficult time, young families with a need to "do something about

God" and people that are not being satisfied in their current community, all these people are looking for us.

Our Vestry goals and the goals of the Mission Strategy committee are very similar: to bring more to God's people in mission and ministry through whatever means are available. Our communications committee is doing an amazing job of putting St. James' out there. We are in the newspapers, on YouTube, and Facebook. We participate in community events like the St. Patrick's Day Parade and the Memorial Day Parade, we offer a Blessing of the Animals during the Hackettstown Day celebration and our fundraisers get us lots of attention. We have to advertise, we need to communicate more with the community through newspaper articles, signs, banners and through one on one conversation with others.

We must let people know that "it's ok" that in our community you are allowed to have a different view, or a family structure that is not the "norm". We need to let people know that when we say "All are Welcome" we mean ALL!


