AT FIRST, I pooh-poohed the warnings as the news media's latest attempt to whip up anxiety and create an addicted audience. It was not until Saturday that I began to study the maps of the hurricane. It was not until Sunday that I

began to believe the computer models of Sandy, the massive storm about to slam into New Jersey.

Ted had already been grocery shopping and I stopped to fill my gas tank, although it was threequarters full. After an uneventful Maintenance Morning at St. James' (during which we did bring in the porch furniture and clean the gutters), at home we brought the deck furniture into the basement and I put my potted mums in the garage. On Sunday afternoon, the world turned grey and an eerie stillness came over the neighborhood. Ted and I hung out in the living room, alternately watching the Jets game and being unable to watch, finally settling on switching between news of Sandy and RedZone (a super show for the easily distracted, it follows the dozen or so pro football games being played on Sunday afternoon, whipping from game to game depending on where the action is). I still did not feel overly anxious about the storm -- it seemed to me that although it was real, it was overly hyped. TV shots of high surf alternated with empty shelves where D batteries and milk used to be.

And then the power went out.

But we had the flashlight, a lantern, and it was eleven at night, so we went to bed. But the wind was howling like we had never heard before. And in the early hours of the morning, we heard a loud bang, but without light and with the howling wind and rain, we postponed investigating until morning. The next day there was no way to get to work, no heat, no lights and no water (because we have a well). But we had filled the tub, and jugs of water. It was OK at first; kind of like camping out. We lit the gas stove with matches, boiled water to wash up or do dishes or cook. We caught up on our reading and took naps. Went to bed early, because it was too frustrating to do anything with a flashlight or candle.

The next day, it was raining some, but we decided to take a walk to see how the neighborhood had fared. We put on our rain gear and headed out. The bang we had heard was a forty foot tree next to the house. It had snapped and fallen away from the roof above our bedroom. Somehow, we found ourselves headed toward the closest Dunkin' Donuts store at a gas station on Route 206. Along the way, the storm became more real as we passed more downed trees and wires, and dark windows. We got our coffee after a 40 minute wait and hiked back home.

As the day wore on, so did we. The house was getting colder, food choices were limited, and cleanup after meals was complicated (not to mention the adventure of flushing the commode).

The next day, we traveled to St. James', where our Parish Hall was fully equipped with lights, heat, functioning bathrooms and a corps of volunteers who were serving coffee and goodies and setting up tables for people to work in our wifi hotspot. Some people used our shower, others played board games or caught up on the news on the big screen TV. We made dinner and invited the community through the local radio station. It was the perfect antidote for the frustration of the cold and the dark.

But the cold and the dark were still at my house. By Tuesday afternoon, on a break at home, I had a full meltdown. The prospect of living without power for more than a week was too much to even consider. I returned to the church where dinner was being served, and one young girl had made crayon drawings for every person who did not have power. She wrote, "I hope you get power!" across the top and handed the cheery drawing to me. A few minutes later, my phone beeped with a text from my husband: "I have one word for you—POWER!"

When I arrived home later that night, I basked in the warmth coming from the heat vents, the ability of the water to flow through the pipes in response to my touch, and the light – the light was the <u>best</u>!

We will all have stories of Sandy: how we prepared for her arrival (or didn't), how we dealt with what she handed out, and what she revealed in us – the good, the bad and the ugly. I am ashamed, and frankly stunned, at how little I could tolerate. I am much more grateful for the garage door which rises at the touch of a button, the warm shower, the way my finger can say, "let there be light!" Most of all, I am so blessed to be part of the St. James' community which rose to the occasion as disciples here regularly do, to affirm our mission cry: *we feed people!*



- *Reaffirmation* is for anyone confirmed in The t Episcopal Church who would like to re-affirm their faith. Many people choose to do this as they enter into a new ministry, begin at a new church, or wish to mark a new step on their spiritual journey.


