Epiphany is winding down. We have rejoiced in the glory of God made human for us, learned how to be disciples, and shined our lights. In this short season (this time around), we have gathered the strength of each other as we prepare for Lent,

which is, as Punxsutawney Phil predicted, "right around the corner."

Watch the sanctuary change from green to deep purple. See the emptiness of the flower vases, notice the silence of the procession, hear the minor key in the music. Listen to the story of Jesus, alone, driven by the Spirit into the wilderness for a time of solitude, testing and strengthening. We know he was hungry, tired and lonely in that time, especially since he was coming from the mountain of his transfiguration when his closest disciples saw him in all his glory.

Barbara Brown Taylor says in her book, <u>Bread of Angels</u>, that Jesus didn't have to wear a veil and no one was afraid of him because he looked "normal" when he came down from that mountain. "It is as if God took the glory ... off his face and tuck(ed) it inside him. God hid it there, to see if people could still discern the glory without the visual aid. Still, what happened on the mountain must have helped Jesus. It must have helped him to know what was inside him, even if it was not always visible. What we are asked to believe is that at certain breakthrough moments in time, the glory of God is certifiably visible... But seeing it may not be the most important thing because we are also asked to believe in it when we cannot see it."

As we enter the season of Lent, we are asked to take a long, hard look at ourselves. It is a time for self-examination, according to the direction of the church. While we may think of self-examination as a solitary act, it is something which may be even more valuable when done in the context of

community. No, it does not mean standing up in church and listing our sins. Confession and reconciliation are, however, acts which take place in the context of our lives as disciples. The church provides a sacrament for such acts; seeing ourselves as God sees us and making amends with brothers and sisters in Christ. The sacramental rite of Reconciliation is this act of confessing to a priest and receiving the absolution of God at his or her hand. Unlike the Roman Catholic church, this confession takes place not in a booth with a curtain, but in the sanctuary, chapel or office. The saying I have heard about confession in The Episcopal Church is "All may. Some should. None must." It is a powerful sacrament, one which I have found in my own life to be an important way to make a break with past sins.

At St. James', your priests are available for private confession in the form of the sacrament of Reconciliation. But if you in your own journey determine that this is not what God is calling you to do for self-examination, I encourage you to find a practice that will help you know that we are all sinners, we all need to see ourselves stripped of the things we have convinced ourselves make us worthy. It may be private conversations with a trusted spiritual advisor. It might be approaching a sister or brother in Christ and saying, "May I share with you the struggles I am having in my walk with God, and will you offer me assurance that God is still with me and give me encouragement for my journey?"

And then hear the Ash Wednesday call: "remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." Hear it the way God would have us hear it, knowing that God has taken God's own glory and 'tucked it inside' each one of us.

Believe it, even when you don't see it.

## Youth Group Saving Kids Lives

The Youth of St. James', along with the whole parish family, have taken on the task to decisively step into the mission field and make a difference by kicking away hunger. In the past few weeks we have enjoyed the encouragement from Justin and MaryAnn Simmons to participate in the "Souper Bowl of Caring" that collects food and donations to support our local food pantries.

In addition, between February 22nd and 23rd, the youth group will participate in the "30 Hour Famine." Around the globe, 925 million people are hungry - that is 3 times the population of the United States. According to U.N. estimates, a child dies from hunger-related causes every 8 to 12 seconds. In total, more than 22,000 children die every day, most of them from simple causes with existing cures: diarrhea, malaria, hunger and more.

During the "30 Hour Famine," St. James' youth - joined by the youth from St. Mary's Catholic Church and other churches - will learn about hunger and take the radical step of going without food for 30 hours as they walk in the steps of hungry kids all around the world.

This year St. James' youth have set a fund-raising goal of \$900, which can be an impressive amount when we consider that every \$30 raised can help feed and care for one child for a month. They will be asking us to sponsor them in their 30 Hour Journey, and that we help them save kids lives; every little bit helps. And remember what a difference one person can make!

The children of the Sunday School travel to The House of the Good Shepherd each year to share their handmade Valentines with residents. They love to bring love to people who sometimes have few visitors or family who live at a distance. ### Save Lives - Give Blood



On Sunday, February 24th, St. James' is sponsoring a blood drive in conjunction with The Blood Center of New Jersey from 9:00AM to 1:30PM. To schedule an appointment, please call 973–676-4700, ext 151

or email <a href="mailto:gtoscano@bloodnj.org">gtoscano@bloodnj.org</a> for more information. All are welcome, so come in and join us. This drive is being held in an effort to meet the urgency of the community's increasing need for blood for the patients who require life-saving transfusions.

Sixteen year olds can now donate blood in the state of New Jersey with parental/guardian consent. The consent forms will be available at the blood drive. Donors must weigh at least 120 pounds and be in general good health. There is no upper age limit for donors provided they meet health requirements. Donors should bring a signed or picture form of identification and know their S.S. #. Please eat a meal one hour before donating and drink plenty of water.

Blood center officials note that each unit of blood donated is broken down into several components including platelets, plasma, and red cells so one donation can save up to three lives.

The donation process is safe and simple. Donors are first asked medical history questions and given a mini-health check, including pulse, blood pressure, and iron level. The actual donation of blood takes just 5 to 7 minutes, and then the donor is given a snack and juice. The entire process generally takes under one hour. Donors will receive a free cholesterol screening.

People with a fever or sore throat should wait until they are feeling better before donating, and there is a 24-hour deferral for teeth cleanings and fillings.
