Do not remember the former things, or consider the things of old.

I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it?

I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert. (Isaiah 43:19-20)

This is God's message for Isaiah to bring to the people of Israel in their bondage in Babylon. God sends word to the people that they will soon be able to return to their home in Palestine. This will become, for them, a second exodus. Like the first one, a chance to escape captivity and travel across the desert to the promised land.

The beauty of this passage is not only the good news that the people are about to realize a dream they had carried since being carried away into exile some fifty years before. The deeper beauty for me is that God reaffirms God's commitment to work through small rather than big. He enters the world through a small family that grows into a small nation. The nation of Israel was so small and vulnerable that it was carted off nearly in its entirety – by its enemies – to Babylon.

To God, small is never insignificant. Small is how God has chosen many times to work in the world — through a single nation, or a single family, or a single church, or a solitary person or an isolated incident.

Anthropologist Margaret Mead said this: "Never doubt that a small group of thoughtful, committed citizens can change the world, indeed, it's the only thing that ever has." Small is what enables us to serve God in a world that is not only desperately in need of healing and new life, but seems to be hopelessly beyond our help.

The Vestry of St. James' spends time in retreat every year. It helps us integrate new Vestry members just elected at our annual meeting. It gives us a chance to look back over the past year to see what has gone on here, and to look forward into the future to see what challenges we face and what service we can do. We are led in our efforts by our good friend Peter Saros, who has worked with us over the past five years on parish development. We go to a beautiful quiet place, the Kirkridge Retreat Center. We have a building to ourselves, with bedrooms and a great room with a wood stove. We prepare and eat our meals together. We party some on Friday night with snacks and drinks, and sometimes conversation stretches into the small hours of the morning.

This year, Peter led us in an exercise in which we discovered something extraordinary. Contrary to the assumption that St. James' is just like any other church – 20% of the people do 80% of the work – we identified 105 people who are involved in one or more ministries or activities here. That means that of our 296 communicants, approximately 216 of which are considered "active" members, nearly one half of the people are doing the work of this parish. This is astounding news!

We also reviewed our accomplishments and activities of the past year. This yielded the normal long list of activities with one new quality: the great majority of our activity was focused on caring for others, especially children and those who are poor. This review has always made us feel good about all the work we do to make this place a place where the gospel is not only preached, but acted out.

We also faced an urgent problem in our future. In 15 months, the Building Fund will be exhausted. This is the fund which pays our mortgage. There was no mistake in our planning or preparation for our building project. 2008 happened, and no one could predict or control the economic realities of our times. We are dealing with this reality now, and the Vestry will create and begin to carry out a plan to address it. You will hear more about it as we continue our work, and we will let you know how you can join us in that work.

It seems impossible that we could increase the numbers of people actively working on our ministries. It is a huge task to find a way to fund our current \$60,000 per year mortgage in 15 short months. Our budget is balanced and appropriate, but there is little room for error. We are facing a very big challenge, and face it we will.

Now that we make our way to the Great Hall by elevator or a short walk, it is hard to believe that at one time our building project seemed overwhelming, if not impossible. The project which seemed almost too ambitious was actually the result of the vision of trying to be faithful to our call of welcome and hospitality. And that vision began as just a tiny hope in the hearts of the people of St. James'.

The Hebrew people were promised that God would to a new thing. God would honor their faithfulness and bring them out of bondage, out of their limitations and into the freedom of God's service: "Do not remember the former things, or consider the things of old. I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not see it?"

May we hear these words as if they are spoken to us:

I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not see it?

As some of you know, I was in a serious car accident last month. I T-Boned another car at 35-40 MPH on Route 202 in Montville when he crossed in front of me as he made an unexpected left turn. I had no time to react. My car was totaled, but thanks to my seat belt and air bag, I survived. I was quite shaken and sustained some deep bruises.

I had begun an extreme fitness conditioning program earlier that month to complement my running routine. That morning, I had worked out and felt great. I felt strong and confident...nothing could stop me... so I thought. Immediately after the impact, things changed. As I looked over the crumpled hood through the fog of the air bag smoke, I felt weak, vulnerable, and totally beaten. Within seconds, I was instantly transformed into different person and felt the lowest of the low. I had blacked-out, I hurt all over, was in a stupor, and my

clothes were bloodstained from a bloody nose.

But luckily for me, soon an angel arrived. He appeared in the form of distinguished looking gentleman in the uniform of the Montville Twp. Volunteer Ambulance Squad. He quickly put me at ease and reassured me. He was gentle, compassionate, patient and competent. At the same time he was upbeat, encouraging and funny. He smiled a lot. While he cared for me during our ambulance ride to the ER, he made me laugh and kept me talking (which was extremely painful but strangely made me laugh even more.) Being suddenly powerless was an odd and uncomfortable role for me. I initially hated it. But he made it "OK" to receive help. It was his time to give and my time to receive help.

At the hospital, I overheard him talking to the other caretakers and referring to me with the greatest respect and concern. When he left the ER, he rubbed my shoulder gave me firm handshake, a big smile and very sincerely wished me well. The impact of the encounter did not hit until later.

The memory of this "angel" touches me a great deal. I nearly tear up just recalling every aspect of our brief time together. I did not know anything about this man, not even his name. But to me, this man embodied everything good, dare I say Christ-like, that is surely in all of us. He showed me what is possible when we show our best qualities to aid others who are weak and vulnerable, and that it is sometimes necessary for us to receive, as well as to give, compassion and love. He was truly an inspiration to me and gave me a gift that I'm sharing with you.

Dear Friends,

Alleluia! Christ is risen! the Lord is risen indeed; Alleluia!

On this Easter, I write full of joy and admiration for our congregation which, like the little engine that could, has managed to perform outstanding feats of outreach in the community. Our recent Vestry retreat was an eye-opener in terms of understanding the dynamism of the St. James' congregation. While conventional wisdom states that 20% of the people do 80% of the work, at St. James' the case is very different. We have about 50% participation among the congregation, meaning at least 50% of the people in the St. James' community participate in at least one church activity. Most congregants participate in 2 or more! Our level of participation shows that the various ministries in the church are very important to the way we see ourselves as a congregation.

It is with that in mind that I write to ask for your help. As you may (or may not) already know, the Open Doors Parish Hall was built with the intention of expanding our ministry as well as accommodating the congregation. Great effort was put into planning

the funding of this effort, we all pulled together, and we now have a magnificent edifice for our hard work. We have expanded our ministry, but because of the economic crisis of 2008, our funding is on a somewhat precarious path. Once again we have to pull together to solve this problem. We need the time and talent that we know is available within our congregation to come up with and execute a plan to cover the church mortgage. This matter is of utmost urgency as we have enough to cover the mortgage for about 12 months.

Several suggestions have already been made, but since the Vestry does not have a monopoly on talent in this congregation, we are asking for your help. Most of the suggestions involve leasing the lower level of the church hall and the rooms in the Mitcham house to non-profit organizations which are compatible with our mission; however, we are open to other suggestions. We also need people to volunteer to be on committees to help develop a plan of action and then implement the chosen plan of action. Any plan will probably involve leasing and real estate, so if anyone is a broker, here is your chance to work for a worthy cause!

This is an urgent matter and it is not just about the mortgage. As Dave Lacouture said quite aptly, "it's more than the mortgage... it's our ministry." As we continue to do what we do, let us remember that we have to focus on making sure the mortgage does not get in the way of our ministry. St. James' has been through tough times before and pulled through, and I am sure that, with God's help, we can pull through this as well.

North Porch Bulletin

North Porch provides year round support

Every Friday North Porch operates a center from St. James' Moore street entrance. Local families in need are referred by local or county agencies to North Porch for emergency supplies for their infants and toddlers. North Porch provides a week's supply of diapers, formula, toiletries and clothes.

It costs a family about \$50 per week per child to provide their baby formula and about \$150 month for diapers and related supplies. Food Stamp programs to not include diapers. Government support programs allocate formula based on the age and weight of the baby but any variance by mother or baby (spills, spitup) means the supply will not last the entire month.

North Porch currently needs: diapers (all sizes), especially newborn and size 6; Enfamil formula (concentrated liquid or powder); Baby Wipes and diaper ointments; baby cereal and food (all stages); zipper-type storage bags (1 or 2 gallon).
