As you see the depth and breadth of our mission and ministry, please remember this: we did it *together*. No matter how talented and gifted the priest, she cannot lead a community to accomplish what St. James' has done without a healthy congregation, dedicated and devoted leaders, and generosity of spirit. Most importantly, none of it can be done without the commitment to our Lord Jesus Christ, and to the baptismal promises which guide our actions and behavior.

When we celebrate the ministry of a Rector, we often focus on how the Rector influenced the parish. We tend to minimize or not even realize the effect the community has on the Rector, and on her vocation as priest. You have shaped my vocation, and I am a more responsive priest with a clearer vision. For that, I thank you.

So let's take time to celebrate, as we did on the tenth anniversary of my ministry with you, what we have done for this community (and the larger community) *together*.

Then, for the future, here are some things you can do to support the St. James' community during transition:

**Give more:** give more money, give more time, give more talent. Run counter to the dull statistics of churches in transition: that church attendance and giving decline in the time between permanent rectors.

There are a number of ministries which could use your support – altar guild, youth group, communications, and choirs, to name a few. In the past six months we have added six Lay Eucharistic Ministers and a Lector! What will you step up for? Try something for a year; see how it works for you.

**Attend worship every Sunday:** See "dull statistics of churches in transition," above. You will benefit and the community will benefit. Remember the liturgy is the work of the people, and your mission will flourish as you are fed by each other in worship and by Christ at God's holy table.

**Support your leaders:** The Wardens are the authority of the parish in the absence of a rector, and the Vestry are the decision-makers. They spend a lot of time together in meetings and reviewing materials necessary for the functioning of this community. They need your support and encouragement. When they stand up and ask for help, respond as you are able. Overlook minor mistakes and glitches, those things which really do not matter

**Pray:** Put the health and welfare of St. James' at the top of your personal prayer list. Pray for all things, large and small, and God will hear you and lead this community.

It is my prayer that in this time of transition, you will explore who you are as a community and what God is now calling you to be. May the words of Isaiah be in your heart: Look! I'm doing a new thing; now it sprouts up; don't you recognize it? I'm making a way in the desert, paths in the wilderness. - Is. 43:19

A note about contact with Cathy – there are very important guidelines for contact with a former Rector. They are not designed to dissolve relationships, but to foster growth and respect boundaries. The common wisdom is to have no pastoral contact, or contact regarding church transition, for one year. Practically, this means I will not officiate at your wedding, baptize, or officiate at funerals. This gives you more opportunity to open your hearts to the next rector, as you did for me when I arrived. Your relationship with your spiritual leader will be deepened and sanctified as you invite that priest into your life events and milestones. Of course, I will be in contact with the Parish Administrator and Wardens in the event of necessary business matters.

Our relationship will not dissolve, but it will change. I would love to be kept up to date with your life and milestones, but never at the expense of the creation of your new relationship with your spiritual leader(s) and the moving forward with your life in community. Please be assured you will not be forgotten; you will be in my thoughts and prayers for years to come.

## From Your Vestry...

The announcement of Cathy Deats departure as Rector of St. James' came as shock and with sadness to many of us. There are members of our parish community who recall the immediate positive impact Cathy's arrival had on St. James' more than a decade ago. Still others know no other Rector but Cathy. And then there are those people and families who proudly claim they are members of St. James' because Cathy is the Rector.

During her 12 years as Rector, Cathy has indeed touched us all. She provided us with both profound spiritual guidance and exceptional administrative and motivational skills. She blessed our children as they were welcomed into the world of Christ, officiated weddings that started new faithful families, prayed with us when we were sick and troubled and comforted and offered the Rite of Burial to our friends and families. One could say these duties are "expected" of a Rector but I'm of the opinion that from her first day Cathy was special and that we have been blessed to have her as our priest at St. James' Church.

Under Cathy's constant motivational and spiritual energy drawn from her deep faith, St. James' accomplished what could have only been distant dreams back in 2000. I looked back recently at some Journals from 2002 and one can see that, even then, the energy and impact Cathy provided. Look at any Journal in the past ten years and you can see the many layers of mission and faithful activity which were extraordinary.

Some of Cathy's accomplishments included, (after tremendous perseverance), providing leadership to the completion of the decade-old vision of building the Great Hall to ensure "Open Doors" and greater accessibility for our faithful and guests. In fact, all the buildings were not only maintained but improved. The sanctuary was given a facelift and other important maintenance and upgrade projects were completed.

Cathy also helped provide organization and structure to the office operations and administrative procedures and steered us to having enhanced financial accountably.

And Cathy challenged us to be a missional church which is to say she sought to extend our faith beyond our walls and our comfort zone. We became an active participant in helping those in need in the

community to a degree we had never experienced before. The successful Back Pack Program is just one example of this commitment. Although it takes many hands to carry-out this much needed project, we all know that Cathy was a powerful force that provides the "glue" to this and many, many other endeavors

Cathy ensured we were always learning about how God calls us either through classes like EFM, her work with children and youth or simply by example. She also challenged us to be prayerful yet practical; to be good stewards but to expand our responsibility to do Gods' work and expand his love. I ask you, what more does God call us to do?

Cathy certainly leaves with a strong positive legacy imprinted on all of us a person who we love and admire.

As we say farewell to Cathy, there is every reason for us to remind ourselves that as we enter a time of change, we have the foundations that Cathy provided us.

We wish Cathy and Ted the best, much luck and blessings as they embark on the next phase of their journey together.

I hope you can join us in celebrating Cathy's Farewell Service to be held in the sanctuary on Sunday, December 8<sup>th</sup> at 4 pm followed by a dinner in the Great Hall.

The Vestry met twice in November; once in Special Meeting to review the Transition Plan Outline, and once in regular Meeting.

#### **Transition Process**

By the time you read this, members of the Vestry will have met with the Bishop to discuss and understand the next chapter for St. James' story. The Episcopal Dioceses of Newark is comprised of 106 churches so pastoral change is not unknown and it is a quite natural course of events. The Diocese is well versed in this area and I expect they will help guide us through the process with support and resources. The details of this process will be forwarded at a later date.

Meanwhile, Cathy and the Wardens have arranged for the Reverend Peter Boyle to serve as a supply priest. He will celebrate the Holy Eucharist at 8 AM and 10 AM on Sundays from December 15<sup>th</sup> through January 12. (One service on December 22, as tradition) He will also celebrate the Holy Eucharist for two Christmas Eve. Services at 4:30 pm and 7:00 pm.

When one becomes available, the Bishop will assign an Interim Priest who is trained to minister to churches in transition. This priest will serve as our priest during our search for a permanent priest. The interim priests helps guide us through feeling the of loss and helps us set the stage and provide the foundation of a permanent priest.

The entre process takes time (12-18 months). It takes time since the process requires diligence, prayer, reflection on and discussion. It is simply the single most important decision we make as a church. Unlike some churches, we are fortunate in that we ourselves choose a new priest as a community instead of having one assigned to us. We are fortunate to have members of the church who have participated in various ways in prior transitions and searches and who can offer both experience and wisdom.

During this time of transition, change and yes... anxiety, we cannot completely hold our breath. Our faith, our ministries and our stewardship and support of one another cannot waiver. We are called by God to continue Christ's work in all its forms and I believe we can.

# 10 Things Every Person With A Disability Should Hear (All The Time!)

Make no mistake — people with disabilities love to hear good things. Praise, respect, jokes, romantic overtures, bring it on. They can turn a crappy day into an awesome one, but only if the words are uttered. For those who love interacting with people with disabilities, or have no problem with it whatsoever, here are 10 things you can say that will brighten our day.

#### 1) "You're hired"

Roughly 10 percent of the labor force are people with disabilities. To all the people out there thinking we're lazy, it's only because employers don't want to hire us.

#### 2) "Yes, we are accessible"

When hunting for accessible accommodations when traveling or even trying to make reservations at a restaurant in old part of town, hearing the phrase "Why yes we are accessible" is one of the sweetest things to our ears.

#### 3) "You're beautiful"

Another phrase we love to hear that's universal is, "You're beautiful," or for the guys, "You're hot." Feeling sexually attractive is a huge happy-maker on the brain.

#### 4) "I forgot you were disabled"

Nothing makes me happier when someone forgets I have a disability. It's usually the only thing most people think about and if you ask me, it's worse than racism. Ableism is the name of the game.

#### 5) "May I help you?"

Hearing the words, "May I help you?" are paramount to telling someone you respect them in the disability world. There's nothing worse than someone taking your bags and carrying them without asking you first.

#### 6) "Cool" instead of "Good for you"

A really simple one is taking the "Good for you" out of your vocabulary and replacing it with "Cool" or some other positive phrase, and not over emphasizing their successes in life just because the person has a disability.

#### 7) "I love you"

Everybody wants to be loved and of course we are no different. Having someone tell us "I love you" is the epitome of acceptance in a romantic relationship, and most people with disabilities still want this in their life. We do not want to live solitary lives even if our disability is hard.

#### 8) "It's fixed!"

Mobility devices from wheelchairs and walkers to shower chairs and automatic lifts all breakdown more often than they should. Try using a wheelchair for a couple of weeks and see what I mean. It's not like a watch breaking or anything like that when our things break. It's a big deal.

#### 9) "We'll still figure out a way to make it work"

When you do come across a place that is not accessible, most places are afraid of liability and don't even try to get you in thinking creatively. It can be a really heartbreaking. Feeling like you're being discriminated against is never good, especially when they don't understand your perspective. When you do run across a business that is more than willing to jerry-rig a solution, "Sure, we can figure out a way to make it work," oh we love you. This phrase gives us faith in humanity.

#### 10) "I don't care if you have a disability"

When you first meet someone on a romantic or a friendship basis, hearing the sweet words, "I don't care you're disabled" is the ultimate thing we could hear. We're so often turned down or not included because of our disability.

So there you have it. Ten ultimate things we like to hear. We may not get a chance to hear all of these things in our lives, but if we could hear just a few, oh we'd be some mighty happy people.

For near 40 years <u>Sojourner</u> magazine has been an articulate voice for justice and peace within the Christian Church and in the nation. Founded and still led by Jim Wallis, it challenges us on a monthly basis to live the Gospel and not just preach it. Wallis is the author of On God's Side:

What Religion Forgets and Politics Hasn't Learned About Serving the Common Good which was published by Brazos Press in April of 2013.

Wallis' columns on Christian thought appear frequently in newspapers such as the New York Times, Boston Globe, Los Angeles Times and Washington Post. He is a commentator on CNN, MSNBC and Fox News and appears regularly across the political spectrum on television shows such as *Hardball* and *The O'Reilly Factor*.
