Dear Friends,

It is with great joy that I look forward to celebrating the Holy Week and Easter services with you and I look forward to as many of you as possible joining us in as many of these services as you are able. Please know that everyone of any faith tradition or none is invited to join us as we remember and live into the events that lie at the heart of our faith.

Holy Week at St. James' begins with two services on the Sunday of the Passion (Palm Sunday), April 13, at 8:00 and 10:00 at which Jesus' entry into Jerusalem is remembered and a story of his final days of suffering and death is read and pondered. On Wednesday evening, April 16, at 7:30 we will have the solemn service of candlelight, readings and prayer called Tenebrae.

On Thursday evening, April 17, we remember Jesus' last meal with his disciples at a simple Agape Meal in the Great Room at 6:00. Then, at 7:30, we celebrate the Maundy Thursday Liturgy, with the Washing of the Feet and the Holy Eucharist in the church. The altar area is then stripped of all adornment and the Reserved Sacrament is moved to the chapel where a prayer vigil is kept until 11:30 on Good Friday. At this time there is a brief service at which what remains of the Reserved Sacrament is consumed. This year we are inviting those who prefer not coming to the church in the late hours of the night or early hours of the morning to sign up for a prayer vigil to take place in their homes. Sign up sheets for both of these will be available in the church or you can sign up for the time of your choice by calling the church office at 908-852-3968.

On Good Friday, April 18, there is a community Good Friday service at the Panther Valley Ecumenical Church at 12:00 noon. At 7:30 PM we will have the Good Friday Liturgy followed by the Stations of the Cross here at St. James'. On Saturday, April 19, the Altar Guild welcomes all to join them for the Holy Saturday lessons and prayers in the church at 11:30 AM.

Our celebration of Easter begins with the "Great Vigil of Easter" at 7:30 on April 19 in the church. This service is thought to have its roots in the oldest service of the Christian Church and includes the blessing of the new fire, a reflection on some of the great events of the Judaic-Christian story, the renewal of our commitment to Jesus Christ through a reaffirmation of our baptismal vows and then the celebration of the First Eucharist of Easter. It is a dramatic and deeply moving service. Easter Day services begin with a shorter and quieter service at 8:00 which is followed by an especially festive service at 10:00.

It would appear that the snow of this long, hard winter is, at long last, going to melt and that our celebration of Easter will take place as the new life of nature begins to emerge. Christianity began in the Northern Hemisphere, the word "Lent" means "Spring" and much of our hymnody ties Easter to Spring and the joy that each and both bring to so many. I spent January through March of one year ministering in South Africa where Easter happens as its people prepare for a long, cold and sometimes hard winter. I am reminded of this as I write with the TV telling me about the pain and heartache of the family and loved ones of the Malaysia Flight 370 passengers and the victims of the mud slides in Oso, Washington and I am reminded of the violence and suffering in so much of the world. This Easter feels devoid of hope for so many. But we can

help. Easter Offering envelopes will be coming to you through which you can support St. James' ministry of resurrection hope to a hurting world. White envelopes will be available in the back of the church to receive offerings for the Episcopal Relief and Development Fund and, has been the tradition in much of the church for many years, the loose offering on Good Friday will go to the work of the Church in Jerusalem.

On a more individual and personal note, many in the Episcopal Church find the sacraments of healing (anointing and the laying on of hands) and/or reconciliation of a penitent (confession) an important part of their preparation for Easter. If you would like to invite me to share either one or both of these sacraments with you please feel very free to call me at 908-269-6054.

There are among us several who will not be able to get to the church for any of our Easter services. If this is the case for you, know that we would like to bring the Easter Communion to you and have the privilege of sharing it with you. Please call the church office at 908-852-3968 and we will get back to you to schedule a time for this to happen.

The Resurrection of Jesus Christ focuses our attention on the fact that it is in the very nature of God to bring resurrections out of every kind of crucifixion, to bring new dimensions of living out of every kind of dying and new beginnings out of every kind of ending. This is true for us as individuals and it is true for all people everywhere. As we celebrate the Resurrection of Jesus this year let us here at St. James' be especially mindful of and rejoice in the new life into which God is leading us during this next year.

2014 Holy Week Services at St. James' Church

Please know that everyone is invited to receive the Bread and Wine of the Eucharist at all of our services here at St. James'.

Sunday, April 13 - Sunday of the Passion - 8:00 and 10:00 AM

On this Sunday, sometimes called Palm Sunday, we remember the entrance of Jesus into the city of Jerusalem and commemorate his passion and death.

Wednesday in Holy Week, April 16 - Tenebrae - 7:30 PM

A quiet service of readings, prayers and diminishing candlelight.

Maundy Thursday, April 17 - Agape Love Feast (6 PM) followed by Holy Eucharist and Foot Washing (7:30 PM)

We remember the meal the disciples shared with Jesus on his last night with them with a simple supper. After supper, we proceed to the church where we wash the feet of one another as Jesus did for his disciples and as he commanded his disciples to do for one another and celebrate the Eucharist which was instituted at that same meal. As the service ends the altar area is stripped of all adornment.

Maundy Thursday Vigil (in the Chapel or in our homes) - April 17 / 18 - 9 PM until Friday noon

During this time many of us take a turn praying for an hour in the presence of the sacrament of the body of Christ in our chapel or in our homes if that is preferable for us. There is a sign up sheet for each of the two vigils. Those coming to take their turn in the chapel are asked to enter via the Moore Street chapel door.

Good Friday, April 18- Community Ecumenical Service - 12:00 noon at the Panther Valley Ecumenical Church

We come together as a community to hear, to reflect upon and to respond to the story of the last hours of the life of Jesus.

Good Friday, April 18 - Good Friday Liturgy and Stations of the Cross - 7:30 PM

We pray the Good Friday Liturgy and follow it with a liturgy of the Stations

of the Cross. Holy Saturday, April 19 - Chapel Service - 11:30 AM

Simple prayers and reflection on the day Christ spent in the place of the dead.

Easter Eve, April 19 - The Great Vigil of Easter - 7:30 PM

Believed by many to have its roots in the earliest service of the Church and certainly

one of its most dramatic, the Great Vigil of Easter celebrates the new light of Christ, rehearses some of the great events in the life of the people of God, invites us to again commit our lives to Jesus Christ through the reaffirmation of our baptismal vows and celebrates the First Eucharist of Easter with the ringing of bells (bring one you have) and the return of Alleluias.

Easter Day, April 20 - Holy Eucharist 8 AM and 10 AM

We celebrate The Feast of the Resurrection with a festive Holy Eucharist accompanied by great rejoicing. Organ, bell choir, senior and children's choir lead the celebration.

Alleluia! Christ is risen.

The Lord is risen indeed; Alleluia!



If you did not get a chance to see it, please take a few minutes and walk to the balcony where it is hanging on the bell tower wall. The members of the Bell Choir were so thrilled that not only Helen's daughter, Jen Howlin, attended the service, but her son, Alex, and daughter, Heather, traveled from Long Island to be present.

A really amazing thing happened on March 16 as the Bell Choir was ringing. All of a sudden I heard someone humming along while the choir was playing *The Old Rugged Cross*. Why Should I Sing in the Choir?

A short article in the January/February of the AARP Bulletin stated that a study done in Finland showed "an improved quality of life among older choir members". Another study done at Georgetown University stated that "older adults who sang in a chorus had fewer falls, fewer doctor visits and less loneliness than those in a control group". Singers are using their minds and bodies and creating something beautiful and helping keep their brains active at the same time. So, what could this mean for younger adults? An earlier start to engaging the area of the brain that can handle the multi-tasking that is singing can probably strengthen the brain sooner!

Almost anyone who has been in a choir knows that the choir is like a family – members support each other, often socialize outside of rehearsals, share in each other's joys and sorrows, and of course, share the bond of making music.

Our choir here at St. James' is much like that and you are missing out on all that! We'd love to have you join our choir family – it's not too late to sing with us for Easter, for example!

A Remembrance of Helen Wise

One of Helen's favorite hymns was *All Things Bright and Beautiful*. For me Helen was a bright and beautiful gift in my life. The day after her funeral I attended the worship service on the ship I was on and the first hymn was *All Things Bright and Beautiful*. The tune was not the one used at St. James', but rather the one used in Great Britain and the one Helen often referred to. She would sing "her" tune for us at choir. Having missed her service at St. James', singing this hymn at the ship's worship service made me feel connected to Helen in a special way.

Helen joined the singing choir in 2004 shortly after moving to the area. Her church was so very important to her, not just because she was the daughter of a vicar, but because her faith was true and strong. She would arrive at the rehearsal anxious to get started and to sing to the Lord.

Shortly after joining the singing choir, Helen joined the Bell Choir. She moved from one bell to two bells and even three on occasion. She was a dedicated ringer, rarely missing a ringing event. This past fall she asked me to include her in the music I was preparing because she so much wanted to return to the Bell Choir, even if she had to climb to the balcony. Unfortunately she was unable to return to the choir.

Helen loved her family and she shared family news with us, things like births, graduations, trips to Long Island to see her daughter and her son and his wife and later "the twins" and her trip to England in October 2012. All of us in the choir awaited the births of her grandchildren with great anticipation and we were frequently treated to pictures of the babies. She shared with us the beautiful blankets she knitted for them. Her face glowed when she spoke of her three children, her son-in-law, her daughter-inlaw and her five grandchildren. What joy they all brought to her.

And Helen brought joy to others. Even in this past year, as she struggled with her illness, whenever

I saw her she was smiling. She remained optimistic about beating her illness. This past year she taught me a lot about faith and struggling with a lifethreatening disease. Visits to her were always upbeat because she was upbeat.

I now miss her smile and laughter and, of course, her wonderful accent. But I will treasure the times we were together and count her friendship as a bright and beautiful blessing in my life.




The Bell Choir assembled a plaque 1 memory of Helen Wise. It can be viewed in the balcony on the Bell Tower wall.


