## **This month in Stewardship - February**

Our Epiphany Sunday scripture lessons discussed the body of Christ and spiritual gifts. I love to listen to the words as Paul projects the images of an eye talking to an ear, or of a person being only an eye or only an ear. How fun. The point being, that for the body of Christ to function, we need all the parts. We are the parts, and although we are all limited in some ways, we are gifted in others. BUT, when we join together we can make lighter work of seemingly impossible tasks. We are able to complement each other.

A few weeks ago we faced a challenging snow storm. Our Senior Warden shared with me that the task of removing all that snow around the St. James' property looked almost impossible to remove as he first gazed upon the expanse of drifts covering our sidewalks. BUT, we did. When, in my past life, when I was a Warden, I remember feeling that way a number of times. There were set-ups and clean-ups from rummage sales. Just so much stuff, I wondered how we could ever move it. BUT, we did. We mustered the many gifts of our congregation to master the challenge.

My mind is often drawn to the charges in the Baptism Liturgy. We are charged "to proclaim the good news of the Gospel. . . , seek and serve Christ in all persons . . . , and to strive for justice and peace . . ." The response to each of these charges is, "I will, with God's help."

Next month we will hold our annual meeting. Our progress through the past year will be reviewed, and our plans for this year will be discussed. There will be a report from each ministry group. May we all strive to face the challenges of our parish life with God's help and the help of each other. Many eyes see the things that need to be done, many ears can hear the call for the directions of our ministries, and many hands make light work. Please prayerfully consider how you can lend an eye, ear, or hand as a stewardship offering to our parish.

Here at St James' we decorate our worship space with fresh flower arrangements. Flowers are a symbol of the beauty and fragility of creation and therefore, symbolic of the Resurrection. Prepared every week by Greenway Florist, our arrangements are made with seasonal flowers whenever possible and according to any liturgical guidelines...for example Advent flowers are blue except for the third Sunday when pink is used.

Parishioners have the opportunity to contribute flowers as a memorial to a departed loved one or to celebrate a joyous occasion (birthday, anniversary, graduation) or in thanksgiving for God's blessings. Greenway Florist bills St. James' directly for the weekly arrangements. Parishioners may sponsor flowers by signing the Altar Flower booklet in the Narthex. A separate check to St. James' marked "Altar Flowers" on the memo line can be placed in the offering plate. Donation of \$20 will cover the cost of flowers, but any amount would be appreciated.

I would like to thank the ladies from Heath Village, who will be contributing items to SCI along with the St. James Yarn Twisters. These ladies have already donated 16 scarves and 3 hats! I plan to purchase more yarn from Michael's when I have a coupon and then deliver some yarn to Heath Village and meet the ladies. Thanks also to Pat Taylor for bringing their completed items to St. James.

Also thanks to the person who left a bag full of beautiful yarn and several pairs of knitting needles, plus a couple of pattern books. This will help us to make some great items for the seafarers. We are always in need of yarn – please no pastels – Red Heart yarn is good, as it can be washed and keeps its shape.

I have sorted out the yarn bins and took several bags of yarn that was not either not the appropriate gauge or color to a local ladies group that knits for the community. There is still a good amount of yarn in the bin that can be used for our projects. 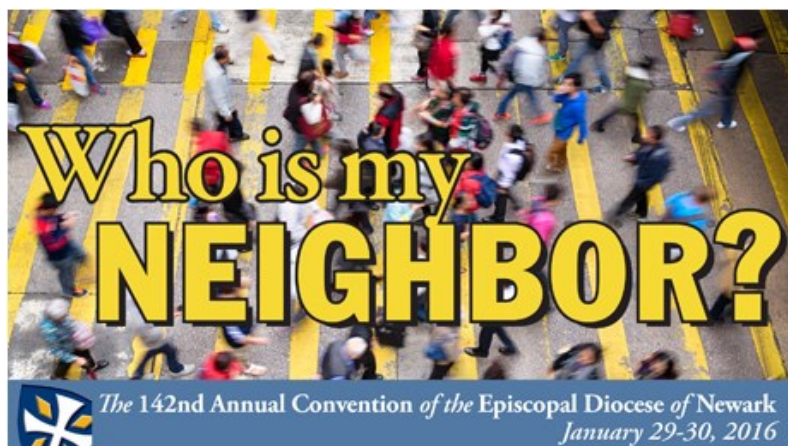
