This Month in Stewardship

Happy Easter! Alleluia! He is risen.

It is Easter and the weather is supposed to be warmer as the days get longer and the flowers bloom. We are most likely spending more time outside, working in the garden or playing. A fellow told me about a great round of golf that he played in this nice weather. He felt that his game was improved because he modified his grip and was hitting the ball better. He must be practicing. Remember: Practice makes perfect.

Remember Father Guy asked us to open our eyes first thing each morning and say, "Alleluia! He is risen." That is a practice. It is a bit different than practicing a golf swing or practicing bowling. Be it a sport, prayer or stewardship, the goal of practice seems to be to perfect an action. It is kind of a neat connection to have the first fruits of our day be an Easter message, just as a principle of stewardship is to offer back to God the first fruits of our labors. Remember: Practice makes perfect, but we are not perfect. If we hit a golf ball with a lapse to a poor grip on the club or if we do not say, "Alleluia! He is risen" as exactly our first thought in the morning, we are forgiven. The journey may be as important as the destination. Remembering to remember that He is risen, may actually be the goal; the words are a reminder

Setting a goal and working towards it is a good spiritual practice, especially as it relates to the stewardship of our time, talent and treasure. In the fall we set a commitment to a goal, our pledge. As we enjoy spring we must keep our commitment in mind and be mindful of our pledge. We recently had opportunities to care for the stewardship of our property and we will have another maintenance morning next month. In the summer, the backpack program will begin again and we can volunteer to sort, pack and give food for less fortunate children. We should also remember to keep up our financial pledges as we are on vacation.

Think "first fruits." Think, "Alleluia! He is risen." Keep practice in your prayers and prayers in your practice.

St. Margaret's Chime Choir at The House of the Good Shepherd

In December 2015, Ruth Petersen, a resident at The House of the Good Shepherd, came to me with an idea for a bell choir. She had been a ringer back in the day and thought it would be great activity for the residents. She was ready to back up her proposal with a donation, too!

After researching the cost of handbells, we realized that we couldn't even afford 1 octave so we decided to get handchimes instead. These turned out not only to give us a bigger bang for our buck – we purchased 2 full octaves plus binders, stands and lights – but the chimes were lighter and easier for the residents to handle. So, the St Margaret's Chime Choir was born. We started in February 2016 with 8 ringers and met every Saturday afternoon for 45 minutes at first. Our goal was to ring at the Easter Sunday chapel service. The members asked to extend the rehearsal time to 90 minutes because they felt they were just getting warmed up after 45 minutes! What director doesn't love to hear that their choir wants MORE rehearsal!

They did play that Easter Sunday – the melody of "Come Ye Faithful" - and everyone was very impressed! This group includes several people who have had no prior musical experience at all, two members who are legally blind, and no one is younger than 80! I write out the music by hand for the legally blind members using a notation that has been collaboratively developed by myself and the two members. It is bigger, of course, than regular music, and also uses certain colors that are easily seen as well as special notations to represent note and rest types.

Next they played for the Bishop and his hiking crew when they stopped at the House during their "Joining Jesus on the Journey" hike across the Diocese in July 2016. The choir played "Take My Life and Let It Be", this time with harmony! It was a special moment for the choir and the hikers!

The next events were playing during Advent and Christmas and preparing for their first concert!

That concert was held on April 1, 2017 and featured the 12 ringers we had grown to. We played 6 pieces including a very complicated setting of the American folk song "O Shenandoah". The concert was given for the residents and staff at the House and the Lodge was packed! The choir performed wonderfully and the audience loved it!

We just played for Easter (actually the Sunday following Easter) and have welcomed another new member! We are now preparing for our next concert which will be sometime in the late Fall. We are looking at three pieces by Hayden, as well as settings of Simple Gifts, Danny Boy, Yankee Doodle, and Dona Nobis Pacem. Of course, we will also be preparing a piece for Advent and for Christmas!

The choir members are a joy to work with! We laugh, we learn a little music theory and music reading, we take care of each other and celebrate our successes. We all exercise our brains by learning something new every week, which is a great benefit to the members. Most importantly, I think, is that they make music for themselves and for the other residents who aren't able to participate. It's very special to have music provided by residents for residents! I feel privileged to work with such a great group and always look forward to each week's rehearsal!

After making Father Guy aware of this request, Julie met with Kathy and gave her a new BCP, a gift from St James'. Kathy wondered if there was any way she might receive the Eucharist. This request was brought to the attention of the Vestry; according to the minutes of the June 2016 vestry meeting, Father Guy visited Colonial Manor to make a "communion connection." And a new ministry at St James' began to take shape.

Kathy Lacouture agreed to organize and then joined the rotation of Lay Eucharistic Visitors....Paul and Phyllis Bartkus, Meg Critchley, Chika Okoye, and Cheryl Perkins each Sunday. In addition to bringing Communion and leading the service, the LEVs distribute our weekly bulletins and quarterly "Forward Day By Day." There are four residents who regularly attend...Geri Colburn, Kathy DiNapoli, Barbara Lobb, Geri Williams, and Mae Moloney, Colonial Manor receptionist. The nursing staff often guides the LEV to stop in on those residents for whom health and /or mobility issues make it difficult to leave their apartments to attend services.
