

St. James' Annual Meeting Minutes-March 8, 2015

Call to Order

The Annual Meeting was called to order with prayer by the Rev. Robert Solon at 10:50 a.m.

Acceptance of 2014 Annual Meeting Minutes

The Annual Meeting Minutes of the 2014 Annual Meeting were accepted without change.

Recognition

Recognition of Junior and Senior Wardens, Outgoing Officers, Church Administrator: Barbara Olesen for stepping up as Junior Warden and Dave Lacouture for his job as Senior Warden, Peter Gartleman and Ellen Infante rotating off the Vestry and Julie Mills as Office Administrator.

Election of Vestry Members and Convention Delegates

Biographical information on candidates was provided to all in attendance. The following slate was proposed by the Nominating Committee:

Elections: Nominating Committee slate was accepted and a unanimous vote was cast.

Financial Report and Annual Budget

Carol Novrit provided and discussed the 2015 budget with all in attendance. The Finance Committee was thanked for their continued hard work on such an important matter. It was noted that the budget for 2015 was drafted and approved in August of 2014 and that it needs to be redrafted as some of the line items have changed. Some of the items discussed by Carol were:

- The Building Account and the Capital Improvement accounts have been combined.
- No income was drawn the Snyder Fund for operating costs.
- ADP is now processing payroll.
- The cost for a priest including benefits were budgeted and that the Rev. Guy Fouts does not need any of those benefits. He will just be paid a salary.
- Line Item 509, Organist, should have budgeted at \$10,000 for 2015.

Mortgage Discussion

Thanks to Anne Edens and Roy Smith and the Vestry, Fulton Bank lowered our mortgage interest which is saving us roughly \$12,000 per year. Because of that, reduced expenses as a result of not having a full-time rector and donations, it was announced that St. James' is financially healthy through at least the first half of 2017.

SENIOR WARDEN'S REPORT

As I conclude my tenure as Senior Warden I want to sincerely thank everyone in the St. James' Church family for their patience and support over the past two and half years.

I'm not afraid to admit that during my time as Junior, and then Senior Warden, I have experienced a gambit of emotions, challenges and doubts. The transition of clergy for any church can be stressful. We were blessed to have a full time Rector with a long tenure that performed many wide and varied duties. The rapid change left many gaps in roles and responsibilities that had to be assessed and addressed. It was like a big puzzle. Some of the puzzle pieces were on the table and just had to be located and placed. Other pieces had not even been manufactured yet. It was a challenge.

Through this process however, the Vestry, other leaders and all the members of St James' Church learned, worked, worshiped and prayed together. Yes, some folks decided to depart but others have joined us. This has been the history at St James' for over 150 years. But for the most part our worship, our ministries, our care for our buildings and most importantly our care for each other and God's community never wavered and still thrives.

I'm very proud to say that during this period, my fellow Wardens, and the Vestry were very committed to maintaining a weekly worship schedule that included the Holy Eucharist. This to me was more important than most anything else since through it, we participate personally and deeply in the love and renewal of Christ. The Eucharist is a gift and a blessing that we can never take for granted. I'm sure it is as important to you as it is to me.

Fortunately, I did not have to tackle all these challenges alone. I have been honored to serve and work side by side with some of the most dedicated and faithful people I know. I truly believe our church is in good hands moving forward. We have excellent clergy and lay leadership and a congregation who collectively offer their many talents and gifts to share.

In conclusion, please keep in mind that the role of the Vestry has changed dramatically in the last two years. Many operational functions and decisions are now in the hands of the Wardens and Vestry. This is just how we have evolved in our transition and it has worked for us. But please be patient and supportive of your Wardens and Vestry. Although the role of the Vestry may seem "behind the scenes" in many respects, their hard work and service "sets the stage" and "opens the doors" for all of us to be able to worship and pray together at our beloved St. James'.

I really look forward to whatever new roles at St James' come my way. But in the meantime, I'm going to take the Rev. Guy Fouts advice and take some time and pray.

MISSION STRATEGY

The mission strategy group supports our church's outreach ministries. As stated previously, our mission is to concentrate efforts locally, trying not to duplicate programs hosted by other churches or agencies. We often, however, contribute to or support those programs. We welcome opportunities to support outreach undertaken by parishioners in activities approved by the Vestry.

We sell grocery gift cards from Shop Rite and Weis Markets as a means of raising money for outreach and as a fund raiser for our church. These stores donate 5% of our sales back to us. (We receive \$5 for every \$100 of cards that we sell.) This year we sold just over \$69,000 worth of cards. Thus, we earned approximately \$3450 for outreach. We transferred \$3000 to the general

operating fund of the church. Contributions of support were also made for the Market Street Mission, community food needs, and for a banner for the BackPack Program.

This year's Christmas Tree of Giving supported three local families by collecting about 56 presents that were divided among 2 girls and 3 boys, ages five to twelve. Our congregation provided wrapped gifts that included clothing, toys, games, art supplies, and (of course) ShopRite gift cards. Thank you to our Sunday School children who colored paper angels to hang on the tree to replace the gift tag candy canes that were taken.

Thanks to the many in-gathering donations made by the congregation, the Sunday School children helped with the assembly of over 60 food bags distributed over Easter, Thanksgiving and Christmas. Each bag consisted of nonperishable foods and some paper goods, as well as at least one ShopRite gift card also donated by parishioners. Thank you to Miss Jennifer, Miss Alicia, Miss Jeanette, and Miss Millie for your super bag-organizing-packing skills and support. Thanks also to Jerry Sheard for supervising the delivery of the bags.

As we have said in the past, we are all members of this committee and welcome the opportunity to underwrite an outreach project that you wish to start.

YARN TWISTERS

The St. James' Yarn Twisters have paired up with the needle workers group at Heath Village since their coordinator, Betty Riles, passed away last year. Already we have a very healthy number of items in the bin, so I would like to thank the ladies at Heath Village, Louise Olshan, Phyllis Bartkus, and Pat Taylor for their ongoing support of the program.

The SCI is a voluntary ecumenical agency affiliated with the Episcopal Church that provides pastoral care, maritime education, and legal and advocacy services for mariners. The historic name of this volunteer program, "Christmas at Sea", only partially describes the work of the people who make holidays a little warmer for mariners. While gift distribution happens during winter months, collection and creation of items happens year round, and while many gifts go to international mariners working "at sea," thousands of gifts also go to mariners working on inland waterways here in the United States. It is located in Port Newark, NJ.

PROPERTY MAINTENANCE

We continue to be blessed with property and structures that facilitate our worship, fellowship, and outreach. Clean-up Saturday crews meet at least twice annually to make minor repairs and touch-ups here and there, or if needed, for a specific project. This is the time to change air-conditioning filters, adjust doors, make sure that the pews are tightly nailed or screwed together, and clean the gutters. Additionally, this year we replaced the chains that connect the bells in our tower (our carillon) to the levers which ring them. A number of missing Parish Hall gutter-guards were also replaced. We refinished and installed the last stainless steel table in the kitchen. The Mitcham House porch was painted. Finally, the elevator was inspected each month as required by law.

We had occasions this year to call on the expertise of licensed contractors to make repairs of a more complicated nature. We needed to replace an old cast iron drain pipe in the Mitcham House that required opening the wall. Electricians were needed to replace the light that illuminates our sign on the corner of Washington and Moore, and to replace light switches in the sacristy. The roof over the priest's office was replaced due to a problem with ice damming and leaking. Finally, the guides for the elevator doors had to be replaced.

We anticipate that we will be making additional repairs and maintenance to the buildings this year. Painting is needed in the early spring to freshen-up the walls and doors in the Parish Hall. This area sees a lot of use because of the Summer Backpack Program. The exterior of the sanctuary also needs painting. The batteries in a few of the emergency lights in the Parish Hall need to be replaced. At some point we may have to replace the Mitcham House roof, and there is a light fixture in the Sanctuary which will need to be replaced. Finally, the trees overhanging the Parish Hall will need to be trimmed back to minimize leaf debris.

Faithful stewardship of our property will insure that it is available for future generations. The key to maintaining it is to make repairs when they are still minor, and before they become too expensive. To that end, please remember that if you see something, say something.

NORTH PORCH

North Porch Women's and Infants' Center is a non-profit organization which provides emergency seven-day supplies of formula, diapers, baby food, clothing, bed linens and other items for needy mothers who are referred by social agencies that work cooperatively with some of the area churches. A project of the Episcopal Church Women in the Diocese of Newark, it maintains sites in Newark, Paterson, Dover, and now, Hackettstown.

On behalf of the North Porch Board, The Rev. Margaret Otterburn extends thanks to St. James' for the space to serve needy families in the Hackettstown community.

COFFEE HOUR

Coffee Hour extends our fellowship at God's holy table (the altar) to the tables in the Great Hall!

We enjoy goodies, catch up with each other, collect children from Sunday School or Youth Group, read the latest Journal or...sign up to host a Coffee Hour!

You can sign up to host a Sunday this year. There is always a signup sheet in the Great Hall. We have hosts who are celebrating a family event like birthday or baptism, hosts who like to bake, and hosts who like to bring Shop-Rite goodies! We also love to have your group (Choir, Altar Guild, etc.) host a coffee hour, and that makes the work easier. As a church which believes strongly in accessibility, our goodies are not all sweet but often include cheese and crackers or fruit.

We would love you to host a coffee hour! Your setup responsibility is to continue to make the coffee for after the 10 am service using our brewer (coffee is premeasured and easy to prepare!), bring and set out the goodies, and clean up or arrange for cleanup. Think about teaming with someone else and divide prep and cleanup.

Join us in celebrating what Episcopalians have called "the eighth sacrament"!

FAMILY BREAKFAST

Pete Quelly has taken the lead of the kitchen crew along with Pete and Gerri Huryk on the first Sunday of each month for St. James' famous Sunday Breakfast. The team has been preparing breakfast classics as well as offering some new dishes such as breakfast pitas, interesting quiches, and morning casseroles. The team is really in need of volunteers to help. In a perfect world, the team would have members who can help with setup, cooking, and/or cleanup so the members could get to attend services, even on a rotating basis. On an average Sunday, 25 guests are served.

We will be missing the Huryk's who have moved to Maryland, but hope to see them from time to time when they come back to New Jersey to visit!

ST. FIACRE'S GUILD

Let me begin by thanking all those who were faithful stewards of the St. James' gardens during 2015. Known as the St. Fiacre's Guild, we officially met twice on scheduled maintenance mornings this year. Because of the diligent efforts put forth in the spring with trimming and pruning, the work during the fall seemed easier. Our usual tasks involve raking up debris, pruning our shrubs and

perennials, and weeding the beds where needed. This kept the St. James' grounds looking tidy. As with any property, the key to maintaining it is to tend it regularly, which we try to do.

Visitors to the Mitcham House were greeted by two new planters as they climbed the steps, as the old wooden ones were weather-worn and falling apart. We filled them with begonias, which bloomed from the spring through the fall.

In a few months it will be a surprise to see what blooms in our gardens because of the unusually warm weather in December. You many have noticed that many bulb plants began to pop up, and that buds even appeared on some shrubs. Flowers actually bloomed on azalea bushes at the Moore Street entrance! We will see what develops as spring draws near; hopefully our plants will bounce back.

Our gardeners take pride in keeping the St. James' grounds looking beautiful. It's a rewarding experience and we welcome anyone who may feel called to share in this ministry.

ALTAR GUILD

In the early days of the church, priests and nuns were responsible for the care of the altar and sanctuary. Later these tasks were entrusted to a chosen group of women who became known as the Altar Guild. Because congregations vary in degree of ceremony followed, our service ranges from simple to elaborate but always grounded in faith and focused on detail and tradition that is offered to the glory of God.

St James' Altar Guild functions with four teams of two women (and sometimes men) who prepare for the weekly Eucharist, care for the sacred vessels and linens, and serve the congregation by arranging for other liturgical services. This requires about one hour of work on either Friday or Saturday at a mutually convenient time set by the weekly team members. Preparations for Easter and Christmas and special services such as weddings and funerals involve the joint efforts of all teams. A local dry cleaner donates his services to help clean and maintain the vestments, paraments, and frontals. One Altar Guild members washes and irons the linens used at the Eucharist. Replacement linens are purchased as holes appeared/or stubborn stains makes linens no longer liturgically white.

We reluctantly accepted the resignation of Ellen Infante during 2015 due to health reasons. Nancy Miller joined Altar Guild on the third week team and has been bringing her granddaughters with her on Saturday mornings and training them to prepare the altar for weekly services. It has been exciting to watch their understanding and skills grow. We invite anyone who is interested in preparing the Lord's Table to stop in after services and speak to the Altar Guild member busy in the sacristy.

The Altar Guild is grateful for the continued support of the St James' parishioners. Without your generous contributions we would not be able to have the beautiful flowers for our weekly Eucharist or Christmas or Easter. Parishioners are encouraged to sponsor weekly flowers in memory of departed loved ones or in thanksgiving for special occasions by selecting and signing the particular Sunday as found in the Altar Flower Donor booklet located in the Narthex.

Altar Guild is not just another church job. It requires dedication, attention to detail and a cheerful willingness to respond to the needs of our congregation. It is a privilege to serve St James'.

The teachers/coordinators this year are Jennifer Howlin, Alicia LaForge, and Jeannette Nolan.

Sunday School students participate each year in sorting and bagging up the donated food for the Mission Strategy Committee at Easter, Thanksgiving, and Christmas. They also prepare holiday songs which they sing during the Christmas Eve and Easter services. STEWARDSHIP

We believe that stewardship is a year-round practice and that it goes hand-in-hand with discipleship. Our theme in this year of transition has been to emphasize our opportunities to share our time, talent and treasure. We encourage all our parishioners to prayerfully discern their stewardship commitment to the ministries at St. James' throughout the year.

This fall our activities included an in-gathering fellowship dinner. This fun evening was well attended and featured a Pete Huryk production of the "Match-Family Feud Game". Our autumn call for pledges has been answered by 35 folks, to date. This was down from last year's number of 45. We have commitments for the operation of the general fund in the amount of \$58,800, which is also down from last year's \$74,400. There were three new pledgers. This year's average annual pledge was up compared to last year. Last year the average pledge was about \$1650, while this year was is \$1680. Twenty-six people have pledged \$23,200 to the Building Fund, which is about the same as from last year. (Dollar numbers have been rounded.)

Thirty-one pledges of time and talent were received for participation in our parish ministries. Eighteen of those volunteered for more than one ministry. The most frequently chosen included;

serving on the altar during worship as an Acolyte, a Lay Eucharistic Minister or Lector. Others included helping with the Backpack Program and knitting with the Yarn-Twisters. More help could be used with counting and coffee hour. If you are interested in any activity you can join in without having filled out a pledge card.

If you have not yet handed in your pledge, however, please consider doing so now and make your commitment to the ministries and mission of St. James' for this coming year.

FUNDRAISING

Fundraising for 2015 is as follows: St. Patrick's Day Dinner, \$161.55; Gertrude Hawk, \$212.62; Golf Outing, \$6,712.76 (almost double from last year!); Rummage Sale and eBay, \$1,804.00; See's Candy; \$102.05 and Scrip Pro, \$469.59. The total raised from these events was \$9,462.57!

Since the FRC is unable to support a Tricky Tray, the committee will put their efforts in support of our Golf Outing Committee. This event in 2015 had approximately 100 golfers and was our biggest fundraising event last year. We hope to continue to grow this into an even bigger, well-known event. COUNTERS

Many parishioners have chosen to go the electronic route to keep on track with their pledges, but we still need to have an account of the offerings on Sunday morning and that is when "counters" are needed.

On Sunday mornings after the 10AM service, there are volunteers quietly working in the Mitcham House office. Their responsibility is to count/record the pledges/donations/memorials from both services for that particular day and then prepare deposit tickets for the bank deposits.

Currently there are four teams (two per team) that rotate Sundays so that volunteers are usually scheduled every four weeks.

If this is a ministry that interests you, we'd be happy to "train" you according to our policies and procedures, and welcome you to our team.

FACILITY USE

St. James' facilities are available to both our parishioners and outside organizations. Guidelines for use of the buildings and donations are available through the church office or on the St. James' website. A Building Use Application should be completed and approved by the Senior Warden prior to using the facilities. Please call the church office and speak with the Parish Administrator if you are interested in using the St. James' facilities.

Offices for the priest and parish administrator are located in the Mitcham House. Space is provided there for the Karen Ann Quinlan Bereavement Center and Literacy Volunteers of Sussex County. Mitcham House also serves as the meeting place for EFM (Education for Ministry), and the Fundraising, Special Events, and Finance committees.

Since 2011, we have provided space in our Parish Hall for the North Porch Program, the Summer Backpack Program and the Church of El Shaddai, whose congregation holds twice weekly worship and Bible study in our Parish Hall and sanctuary.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Our goal for 2015 was to switch the accounting software from Connectnow to Quickbooks. After trying this for several months, we have decided to remain with Connectnow.

Reports are generated each month for the Vestry to review the income and expenses for the previous month and to assess where we are financially with respect to our budget.

St. James' uses a unified budget that includes both operating and building income and expenses. The building income and expenses are shown as line items for specificity.

There are currently two checking accounts within our financial system: The Operating Account and the Building Account. The Snyder Fund is a separate investment account

The Operating Account is used for the day- to- day operation of the parish. The funds used to support this fund come from pledges, special offerings, fundraising and other undesignated income. The expenses include salaries, utilities and any other miscellaneous expenses.

The Building Account is used primarily for mortgage payment, major repairs as well as any other significant improvements needed in our church buildings. This account is funded with pledges and specific donations or bequests.

The Snyder Family Endowment Fund was designated as a fund to generate interest that could be used for the general operations of the church, if needed. Based on earnings and the common practice of using between 4 and 4.5% of the 5-year average endowment value, the Fund has contributed approximately \$22,000 annually to the Operating Account over the past few years. However, the Vestry voted to suspend that transfer about mid-year to allow for more interest to accumulate. Based on the salary differential between a full-time rector and a part-time interim, we were able to effectively do without this transfer for almost two years.
